## TOPS from the TOY SHOPS



A toy fire engine that pumps a stream of real water into the air is made by the Chas. Wm. Doepke Mig. Co., Dept. A. Rossmoyne, Ohio, to sell for about \$15.95 (\$16.75 in the West). The rubber hose, carried on a reel beneath the truck's road bed, is unwound by means of a crank. Copied from an American-LaFrance pumper, it has detachable ladders, fire extinguishers, a bell and steerable front wheels.

Shard job ahead, but it's a cinch he'll need a boost from the family pocketbook, to even come close to satisfying the youngsters' hunger for toys that are new and different. American toy designers seem to have outdone themselves this year in an effort to make the job of finding the right thing for young Johnny or Suzy an easy one. In fact, from the hundreds of toys now available, we had a hard job picking a selection to show you here. There were so many good-looking, fascinating, educational (the-kind-with-the-fun-still-left-in-them) toys that we hated to leave any out. The Toy Guidance Council recommends most of these. Worthy of honorable mention are a few toys

not illustrated on the next few pages. For instance, Jokari, a paddle and ball game by Jokari, Inc., 30-A Church St., New York, in which ball snaps back automatically to a center control box (\$2.98 to \$7.49); a kit of 15 action toy patterns, about \$1.00 postpaid from Craftplans, Dept. D, 1321 S. Michigan. Chicago 5; a plastic coloring apron with pockets for crayons and coloring book, \$1.00 ppd. from Allison-Boothe, Dept. 9H, 511 E. 136th St., Hawthorne, Calif.; and a Magnetic Global Air Race, about \$4.95 from Replogle Globes, Inc., 325-M N. Hoyne Ave., Chicago 12, played with magnetic planes and an 8 in. globe.

That's a fair sample and, doggone it, we certainly wish we were young again. . . .

Would-be switchboard operators will love the Ring 'N Buzz Switchboard, which has 6 plug-ins, and rings and buzzes when calls are coming through. Price of about \$8.98 includes 2 flashlight batteries and 2 plastic telephones connected with 3 yds. of cord. A. Kamkap, Inc., 200 5th Ave., N. Y. C.

The door of this 9 in, garage opens automatically when a car touches it. Force of car hitting door knocks it off center, causing a spring and bracket to raise the door. Priced at about \$1.49. When a 71/4 in. station wagon with friction motor is included, price is about \$1.98. Courtland Mfg. Co., 200-M Fifth Ave., N. Y. 10.



Junior (and Senior) will have hours of fun out of this year's additions to model train equipment. The Lionel line includes a remote-controlled barrel loader (right), priced at about \$7.75. Workman topples each barrel onto a moving conveyor which takes it to loading platform; chute carries it to railroad car. Switch tower in background costs about \$7.95. As train approaches, switchman hurries inside to throw switches; watchman descends flight of stairs with mail pouch. The freight station (inset) with 2 men hurrying about on baggage cars retails for approx. \$7.95. Mfr. is Lionel Corp., Dept. B, Irvington. New Jersey.












As it is pulled along, the wheels turn, forcing compressed air into the smokestack, and causing rainbow-colored bubbles to pour from the funnel at the top. Manufactured for 2-to-5 year olds, by Ideal Toy Corp., 200 Fifth Ave., New York 10, N. Y., to sell for about \$2.98.

A 59c toy model of the Lockheed F80 "Shooting Star" jet plane (below) rides on a free-spinning tricycle landing gear. Product of Anchor Plastics Co., Inc., 535 Canal St., New York 13, N. Y., the plane is launched along the floor by compressing a catapult spring located in fuselage with a metal release trigger inserted in the tail end of plane. Wingspread is 81/2 in.; length of fuselage is 71/2 in.



Y., it has 25 brass reeds and 25 large keys (15 white and 10 black). Twin pedal operated, it produces rich melodic tones. Sold complete with bench and instruction song folio, organ retails at about \$25.





Shuffleboard moves indoors with a twothirds regulation size set made by Dimco-Gray Co., Dept. S, 207 E, Sixth St., Dayton 2, Ohio. Playable wherever there is at least 30 ft. of straightaway space on a solid base, set includes 4 lightweight 4-ft. aluminum push sticks and 8 discs (4 red and 4 black), costs about \$16.95. Instructions included for painting a court on any concrete surface.



The American Flyer line of model railroad accessories, mfd. by A. C. Gilbert Co., Dept. AF, New Haven 6, Conn., includes an animated station and coach for about \$14.95 (below) and a handcar, about \$7.95 (left). Four tiny passengers stride up and down station platform as train pulls in. Coach stops, passengers board. When trip is completed, passengers leave train. Two figures pump handles of hand-car, designed to operate on American Flyer "S" gage track.





A small seamstress sews cardboard clothes to boy or girl dolls with colored tipped yarn laces, in a variation of paper doll cutouts called "Sew-On Cards" (above). Mfd. by Ed-U-Cards, Inc., Doll Div., 248 W. 23rd, New York, to retail for about 79c, toy features pre-punched holes in figures and clothes which eliminate the need for scissors.

The small mother can make 9 in. felt costume dolls from many nations with the kits (about \$1.00) manufactured by Mimi Kay Specialties, 914-M Hayes Ave., Oak Park, Ill. The Mexican Rosita kit (right) includes a flesh-colored piece of felt with body and face outlined; red felt for turban, bandeau, skirt, shorts, slippers; green, yellow and purple felt strips for ruffles; gold or silver beads for bracelets, earrings, necklace; embroidery floss for indicating features.
