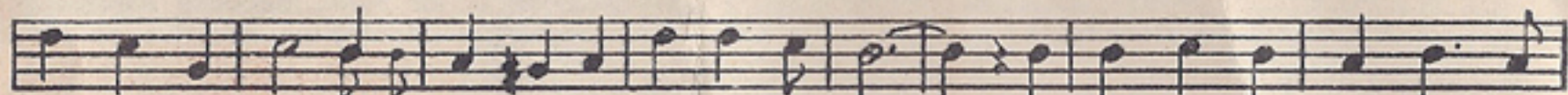
FLYING TRAPEZE



Once I was hap-py, but now I'm for-lorn Like an old



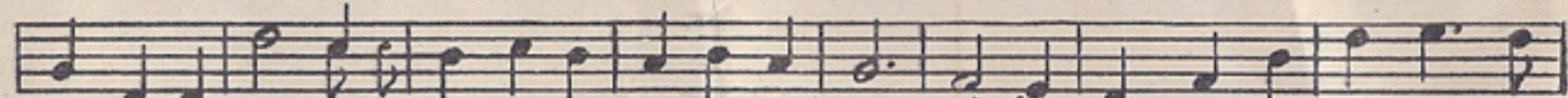
coat that is tat-tered and torn, Left in this wide world to
